President's Corner

Janet Sirlin Roberts-

Just recently, Gavin Newsom signed a bill placing a \$15 billion statewide school bond on the March 2020 ballot. Yet *another* school bond aimed at improving infrastructure in Kindergarten through 12th grade districts and community colleges. It will also be used to increase housing at CSU Sacramento and each of the University of California campuses.

Fairfield residents currently pay for school bond measures J and Q for the Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District, and for Solano Community College. Vacaville Unified School District has Measure A. These payments are reflected on property tax bills, and (in my opinion) the amounts are substantial.

Significant progress and work is and has been going on with monies collected from us at each of these locations. Now the State wants us to pay more. School districts having been receiving bond money for years and years and years, and they just keep asking for more. And don't forget—these bonds are only for new building and repair/modernization of existing buildings. They do not provide for new programs; they do not offer additional services to disabled people or veterans; they do not help children and babies. No new classes, no new teachers, no new professors. Buildings. Renovation.

Also, hidden 12 sections in to the text of the new (40page +) bill, all the way down at part (F)(2) it specifically states that, "...the department shall further prioritize projects that include the use of project labor agreement." "Shall" in legal terms means "must". It removes the decision making process and prevents local district project managers from choosing non-union construction workers and non-union companies. No longer can a local project manager evaluate a particular project and make the determination that a non-union establishment (of which there are many in Solano County) is best suited for a particular job. (It is not clear whether there is a base threshold for this requirement or whether it is an across the board mandate.)

This portion of the bill blatantly supports one special interest group (Building and Construction Trades Council) to the detriment of another, including but not limited to those sole proprietor, family-owned, and local businesses and corporations in the building trades that have determined it is not in their best interest to be unionized. This goes against the most basic principles of the Republican Party, by interfering with business and business contracts, particularly where they are local, and when it is clearly designed to use legislation to promote one special interest over another.

When the March election rolls around, these things should be taken into serious consideration-- despite claims that it will benefit "vets, the disabled, and children". Laws pertaining to buildings and access to them for ingress and egress are provided federally and can be improved by the State. Nothing in this Education bill will change how the disabled will utilize school structures. Likewise, this bill is not permitted to assist the veterans in any manner other than to build, renovate, modernize, etc. a *building*. It does not provide physical or mental support, nor does it provide them with new classes or programs. By now you have likely figured out that the kindergarten through 12th grade children will not be getting more teachers, better or more courses, or more field trips to "cooler" places. Vote no to \$15 billion more out of our pockets.

Under her leadership, the committee voted to be an elected committee for March of 2020, became boots on the ground active supporting Republican Erin Cruz's recall of Governor Gavin Newsom, the monthly fundraiser dinners are at maximum capacity with engaging speakers and college partnerships, began training workshops while increasing outreach to the community, and started an early endorsement program to win in 2020.

Literacy Program

Reach Out and Read: is a pediatric literacy program (age 0-5) supported in partnership with Solano County Library, small health clinics in the county and larger medical groups such as North Bay Healthcare Foundation, Sutter Regional Medical Foundation and Kaiser Permanente. It makes literacy promotion a standard part of pediatric care.

Understanding that the time to start reading to children is in infancy, pediatricians and healthcare providers incorporate books and reading into well baby checkups for children from birth to five years old.

During the checkup, health-care providers give parents concrete, developmentally appropriate advice about reading, as well as use books as an assessment tool in determining the child's development.

At the end of each visit, the child is given an age and language appropriate book. Trained volunteers also share books and stories with children while they wait for their appointments, showing, by example, successful techniques for reading aloud.

**Each guest speaker at a Solano Republican Women Federated meeting is asked to sign a bookplate in a child's book indicating a donation of the book is being made by Solano Republican Women Federated and the book is then donated to the Solano County Library Reach Out and Read Program.*

Governor Newsom's Bill Action - It was a tough week for Californians in the north state. With PG&E initiating the largest blackouts in California history, many Californians are remembering the recall of Governor Gray Davis and the events leading up to that. But the PG&E crisis didn't stop Governor Newsom from taking action on many bills still left on his desk. The Governor still has until October 15th to either sign bills or veto them. Bills with no action by the Governor also become laws. Here is what has been signed or vetoed over the last two weeks.

AB 5- SIGNED: This bill severely hampers our growing gig-economy in our state, by mandating millions of independent contractors be considered employees, according to the Dynamex Decision equation. But, if you were one of over 30 industries with the money to lobby the Democrat legislative majority to exclude your business, they happily complied. Except for Uber, Lyft, Door Dash, and other major gig-economy players. This is because the Democrats in the legislature do not like the inability to regulate and make money for the state off these giant businesses. But who really gets hurt is the worker, but the Democrats don't seem to mind. People working as independent contractors for businesses like Uber and Lyft need these second, sometimes third jobs just to make ends meet and afford to live in California- another failing of 40 years of Democrat Legislative rule.

AB 310- SIGNED: Thanks to Assemblywoman Nancy Skinner, felons will now be allowed to serve on our juries.

AB 392- SIGNED: Our law enforcement officers are already under deep pressure and scrutiny in this new era, but AB 392 puts their safety and ours at risk by changing the "use of force" law from reasonable to necessary. Officers need to make tough, split second decisions every day to keep us and our communities safe. This law only makes it more difficult for officers to decide what is necessary and allows the suspects to flee, making the public potential targets in the process of escape.

AB 792-VETOED: This bill would have imposed civil penalties on beverage companies if their plastic bottles do not comply with post-consumer recycled plastic regulations mandated by 2030. Beverage companies would have been mandated to produce at least 50% of recycled plastic containers or face big fines.

AB 891-VETOED: This bill would have allowed people to sleep and live out of their cars in cities of populations over 300,000 in specified, mandated areas. Called, "The Safe Parking Program", which actually just sounded like a public safety nightmare.

AB 1482-SIGNED: Even though voters struck down the rent control proposition last election, Governor Newsom and Legislative Democrats think they know better than the voters, so they passed this version of rent control anyway. Now, yearly rent increases will be limited to 5% over the next decade.

AB 1505- SIGNED: This bill inhibits a charter school's ability to appeal decisions made by the county boards of education to establish or renew a school's charter.

SB 1- VETOED: SB 1 would have rolled back Trump Administrations EPA regulation easements to the Obama Administration. This would have severely undermined the work of farmers, water districts, and environmentalists, who had previously reached voluntary agreements, particularly in the Central Valley. Luckily Governor Newsom, who worked to facilitate some of those agreements, vetoed this blatant attack on President Trump's environmental regulation cutbacks.

SB 24- SIGNED: Now abortifacients are readily available on all California public college campuses.

SB 127- VETOED: This bill would have diverted even more highway rehabilitation funds from our roads and use it for bike paths, pedestrian walk-ways, and transit upgrades. Luckily the Governor didn't want yet another gas tax fraud on his hands and vetoed this bill.
